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Abstract

Against the backdrop of rising levels of social conflict, corruption, and environmental disasters, the significance of education in terms of ethics and morality has only increased. This essay discusses the ways in which the study of ethics and morality in education helps bring about good for the individual and society. While education is more than what is studied from books, its importance in moulding one's character and morals cannot be denied. Aristotle and many others have stressed the significance of virtues such as honesty and bravery in education. Mahatma Gandhi also advocated for truthfulness and non-violence in education. In contemporary times, John Dewey has pointed out that education helps in developing democratic thinking. Yet, in today's era, education pays more attention to academic excellence rather than moral development. 5. PHILOSOPHICAL FOUNDATIONS OF MORAL EDUCATION:

5.1 VIRTUE ETHICS – ARISTOTLE: Virtue ethics ⁽⁹⁾ focuses on the development of moral character rather than just rules or consequences. Moral education is achieved through the cultivation of good habits over time. Lived that virtues such as courage, temperance, and justice are essential for living a balanced life. These virtues are not innate but are developed through consistent practice and guidance. Education, therefore, should create opportunities for students to practice ethical behaviour in daily life. Thus, virtue ethics highlights that true education builds not only knowledge but also strong moral character.

5.2 GANDHIAN PERSPECTIVE: The Gandhian perspective on education ⁽⁶⁾ strong emphasis on moral and ethical values, that education should focus on the development of truth (Satya) and non-violence (Ahimsa) as guiding principles of life. Learning is not just intellectual but also moral and spiritual, and the importance of self-discipline and character building in shaping responsible individuals. Moral education should be integrated into every aspect of teaching and daily activities. Believed in learning through practical experience and community service. The concept of “Nai Talim” aimed at holistic education combining work, knowledge, and values. Teachers, in his view, should act as role models of ethical behaviour. Education should promote simplicity, honesty, and respect for others. Thus, Gandhian education seeks to create individuals who contribute positively to society through moral living.

5.3 PRAGMATISM – JOHN DEWEY: Pragmatism in education ⁽⁴⁾ emphasises learning through experience and active participation, that moral education should not be limited to theoretical teaching but should arise from real-life situations. Students develop ethical understanding through social interaction and problem-solving activities. Schools are miniature societies where democratic values can be practised daily. In such environments, students learn cooperation, respect, and responsibility, and participation in group activities helps learners understand fairness and justice. Teachers act as facilitators, guiding students to think critically and make ethical

decisions. Moral development, therefore, is a continuous and experiential process. It also highlighted the importance of communication and reflection in learning ethics. Thus, pragmatism promotes education that prepares individuals for active and responsible citizenship.

5.4 CRITICAL PEDAGOGY: Critical pedagogy ⁽⁵⁾ education as a powerful tool for social transformation and justice that traditional education often reinforces inequality by treating students as passive recipients of knowledge. The idea of “conscientization,” or critical awareness, where learners question social, political, and economic realities. Ethical education should empower students to challenge injustice and oppression. Learning should be dialogical, involving open discussion between teachers and students. This approach promotes equality, respect, and mutual understanding in the classroom. Education must connect with the real-life experiences of learners. Teachers act as facilitators who encourage critical thinking rather than imposing ideas. Ethical development, in this view, includes awareness of human rights and social responsibility. Critical pedagogy aims to create informed, active citizens who work toward a more just and equitable society.

7.5 Absence of structured curriculum for moral education: Absence of a structured curriculum for moral education leads to inconsistency in teaching ethical values across schools. 8. RECOMMENDATIONS:
